



Apostile Vocabulary and Nomenclature

A comprehensive reference guide to essential terms and concepts used in apostille authentication, international document legalization, and cross-border certification processes.

A

- **Apostille:** A certificate issued under the Hague Convention authenticating the origin of a public document for international use.
- **Apostille Convention:** The 1961 Hague Treaty abolishing foreign document legalization requirements between member countries.
- **Apostille Seal:** The physical or electronic seal applied to an apostille certificate verifying authenticity.
- **Apostille Certificate Number:** Unique identification number assigned by a state authority for tracking.
- **Authentication:** Verification of a public official's signature and seal for countries not in the apostille treaty.
- **Affidavit:** A sworn written statement notarized for legal or apostille use.

- **Long-Form Certificate:** Full, detailed vital record accepted internationally.
- **L.S. Seal (Locus Sigilli):** "Place of the Seal" notation used in notarial law.
- **Ledger Book Verification:** Signature verification against archived records.
- **Letter of No Record:** Statement that no vital record exists for the requested person.
- **License Verification Letter:** Confirmation of professional or business licensing.

- **Residency Certification:** Government confirmation of legal residency.

- **Rejection Slip:** Notice explaining why a document was not accepted.
- **Requestor Identity Requirement:** Regulations on who may request apostilled records.

- **Secretary of State Authentication Unit:** State-level office issuing apostilles.

- **Two-Step Legalization:** State authentication followed by embassy legalization.
- **Travel Consent Letter:** Notarized parental permission form for minor travel requiring apostille.
- **U.S. Department of State Apostille:** Federal apostille for federal documents.
- **Uniform Notarial Certificate:** Standardized notarial wording acceptable for apostille.
- **Uncertified Copy:** Copy without legal certification — not eligible for apostille.
- **Under Seal Record:** Document issued with an official seal.
- **Uploading Portal (e-Apostille):** Online system for electronic apostille requests.
- **University Registrar Seal:** Seal verifying education documents.
- **Unsworn Declaration:** Alternative to notarized affidavits (not accepted internationally).

- **Work Authorization Letter:** Employment letter requiring apostille for foreign jobs.
- **Withdrawal Notice:** Notice that a submission has been canceled or withdrawn.
- **X-Number Index (Archive):** Archival code used by some agencies for document lookup.
- **Xerographic Copy Certification:** Certification of photocopied documents.
- **Year-of-Event Requirement:** Country rule requiring vital records to be recent (e.g., last 90 days).
- **Yielded Jurisdiction:** When authority is transferred to another agency for apostille validity.
- **Youth Travel Documentation:** Documents for minors traveling abroad requiring apostille.
- **Zero-Alteration Rule:** Requirement that no markings or staples be removed from official documents.
- **Zonal Authority:** Regional governmental authority issuing records.
- **Zip-Code Match Verification:** Identity verification check for mailed submissions.
